Course aim and objectives:

This course is to help students entering graduate-level programs to develop an awareness of current and effective research and writing practices with the goal of implementing and synthesizing such practices into their writing and research projects. Students will also learn to effectively integrate writing and research skills into the writing projects they will pursue throughout their graduate-level programs.

- 2. Synthesize data, theories, models, and concepts from the research in a coherent and meaningful manner in an academic paper.

- 4. Demonstrate effective use of reliable print and digital resources to serve scholarly interests and writing/research goals.
- 5. Produce a research proposal and a formal methodology for conducting primary research.
- 6. Demonstrate effective academic writing that exceeds graduate-level expectations.
